

FAMILY DETENTION IS A FAILED POLICY

Research. Rethink. Resolve.

KEY FACTS ABOUT FAMILY DETENTION

- From 2014 to 2015 the number of family detention beds will have expanded from fewer than 100 to more than 3,700 beds.
- The families in detention today have fled life-threatening circumstances, including gender and gang-based violence, in their home countries.
- Most families pass an initial “credible fear” screening and may be eligible for asylum.
- More than half of children who entered family detention in 2014 were six years old or younger.



AN ARBITRARY DECISION AT THE BORDER

Detention should only be used to mitigate public safety or flight risk, and only when other measures such as alternatives to detention (ATDs) could not mitigate those risks. Families are detained because 1) a family detention bed is available and 2) to deter others from coming to the US. The decision is arbitrary, inhumane and has irreversible life changing consequences for mothers and their children.

DETAINED

TRAUMA

Detained families are fast-tracked for removal, despite seeking protection and asylum. Parents and children often experience depression, malnourishment, and further trauma.

NO ACCESS TO JUSTICE

Families are not guaranteed counsel, and from detention it is especially hard to obtain a lawyer. Without one, it is often impossible to advocate for release or navigate a court case.

COST OF FAMILY DETENTION

It costs \$343 to detain a single family member each day and well over \$300 million each year.



RELEASED OR ATDS

SUPPORT AND CARE

Whether released or placed into ATDs, families may reunite with relatives and are more likely to access critical trauma-informed care and services.

A CHANCE AT RELIEF

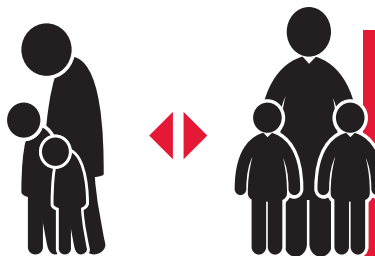
Families who are released have a much better chance to find a pro bono or low-cost lawyer to help them understand their case requirements and advocate for protection.

COST OF RELEASE OR ATDS

The government could either release a family or use ATD programs at minimal cost.

RETURN TO HARM

Many in detention are never released and unable to win their case. If deported, families return to the same trauma and life-threatening circumstances they desperately fled.



FAIRNESS AND PROTECTION

Released families are more likely to find a lawyer and have time to prepare their case to be heard by a judge. If the judge grants asylum, families can start a new life in the United States.
